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TASK

4. How will your map reflect the needs of the user?
5. Could you include quizzes and activities for children to complete?
6. How you present your page is up to you - how will you structure it?
7. Think about what you would like to see on your page because you are writing for children of your age!

Extension

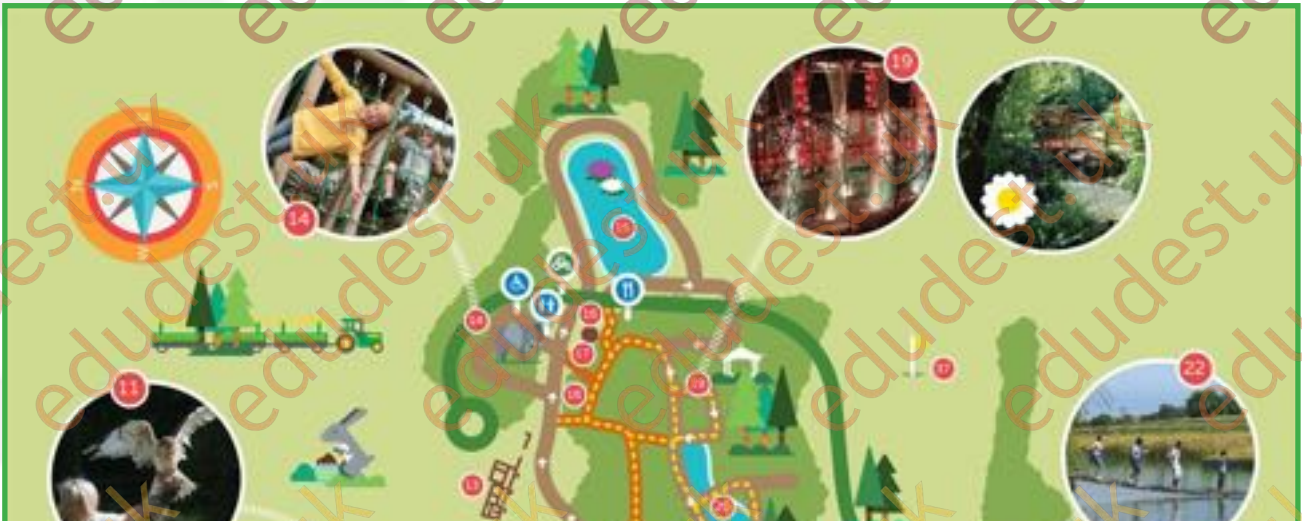
You will then compare your map to an aerial photograph of Robin Hill (using Google Maps).

Can you plot the places from your sketch map on to the photograph?

Can you use the scale from the photograph to calculate the size of the park?
